Queen Elizabeth II Dies at Age 96

On September 8th, 2022, Queen Elizabeth II died peacefully of natural causes at the age of 96 in Balmoral Castle, Scotland.

On April 21, 1926, Queen Elizabeth II was born in Bruton Street, London, United Kingdom. She lived a full life, becoming queen in 1953. She was queen for over 70 years and one of the longest lasting of the royal family to be on the throne. She died just over a year after her husband, Prince Phillip, who died on April 9, 2021.

In June 2008, the Canadian government made a formal apology for its part in Residential Schools. We observe September 30th as a National Day of Truth and Reconciliation.


