On November 15, 2022, two stray missiles struck a farm in Poland, near the border of Ukraine, killing two Polish civilians.

Joe Biden, President of the United States of America, made an announcement at a conference aired on TV, stating that he would "Defend every inch of NATO soil." When confronted, Russia continuously denied any responsibility, claiming that the missiles weren't fired by them.

It was unclear if Poland would enact 4 or 5 NATO article, 4 meaning a meeting would be held amongst the NATO countries to decide what course of action to take.

With the missiles having all evidence pointing towards them being Russian, Poland evoked NATO article 4. At this point, people were now wondering if Poland would evoke article 5 or not, meaning that an attack on one or more NATO countries would be considered an attack on them all.

This point is the closest we have to World War 3

since the era of the Cold War.

Shockingly, as the meeting for article 4 was being held, it was revealed that the missiles that struck the farm in Poland weren't in fact Russian, but missiles fired by Ukraine in a defensive missile barrage to Russian Forces.

Poland immediately called off article 4, as it was deemed an accident.

Blame was still put on Russia in many countries, since this incident would never have happened if the Ukrainian Invasion never took place. Aid and improved surface-to-air targeting systems were immediately sent to Ukraine so that an incident like this never occurs again.

First Arab Country to Host FIFA World Cup

In November of 2022, Qatar was the first Arab country to host the World Cup.

Qatar is relatively new to the sport of soccer, playing their first official match in 1970. Since then, the country has adored the sport and their team has improved greatly. As of the year 2019, Qatar won the Asia Cup, creating memorable runs in the tournament's history.

The World Cup has traditionally been held in either May, June, or July, but due to Qatar's temperature reaching over 40 degrees Celsius, they moved it to a cooler time of year. There are questions regarding how the country will host this big event given it's the smallest country to ever host the World Cup, at a population just under 3 million.

People have said that Qatar is a controversial host because of how they treated the workers that built the stadiums. Concerns also persist about Qatar's attitude towards free speech, women's and LGBTQ+ rights, present in a country where it remains dangerous to openly criticize the government.

The World Cup is hosted every four years, and each year a different country hosts it. It's a big event because many countries from around the world will compete in a soccer tournament where only one country will be crowned champion. Correspondingly, the tournament can unite nations, stop wars and bring together countries from across the world in one unifying competition.



After watching a World Cup match as a school community, we went and polled students and teachers to see which team people predict will win the FIFA World Cup. The results are seen to the left.




The Yearbook

Why should we have a yearbook?


